January 4, 1924 - January 8, 2006

Frank Manolovitz, 82, Bismarck, died January 8, 2006 at a local hospital. Services will be held at 11:00 AM Thursday at McCabe United Methodist Church with the Rev. Art Scanson officiating. Burial will be in Sunset Memorial Gardens with military rites by VFW Post 1326. Visitation will be from 5:00 to 9:00 PM Tuesday and 9:00 AM to 9:00 PM Wednesday at Eastgate Funeral Service where a Moose Ritual will be held at 7:00 Wednesday evening. Visitation will continue for one hour prior to the service at the church. Frank was born in Selfridge, ND January 4, 1924 to Anna Shank and Mathias Manolovitz. He attended School in Solen, ND. Frank farmed with his father until he joined the Army, he later transferred to the Reserves, but during the Korean Conflict was called up in 1950 to the Army Ordinance 2nd Mechanic. He was discharged in 1952. Frank worked for Corwin Churchill and Welk Steel before joining the Iron Workers in 1962. He worked on all power plants, missile sites and many buildings in Bismarck. He married Frances Kvasnicka Guptill October 7, 1961 in Bismarck where they have lived ever since. Frank was a member of the Order of the Moose, Moose Legion, 25th Club, Amvets and was a life member of the V.F.W. He enjoyed fishing and coffee with his Moose buddies. Frank is survived by his wife, Frances; one daughter, Karla Ron Stenberg; one grandson, Aaron Jill Stenberg; two sisters, Katie Mathern and Lorraine Kahl; and many nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents, Anna and Mathias; five brothers, Fred, Adam, Paul, Pete, and Matt; three sisters, Anna Skiftun, Eva Kreitel, and Doloris Telin; and one
