Grace C. Register, 101, died April 21, 2004 in Bismarck. Services will be held at 10 AM Saturday at the McCabe United Methodist Church, Bismarck, with the Rev. Art Scanson officiating. Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery, Bismarck. There will be no visitation. Grace C. Cummins was born August 13, 1902 in Casselton, ND the daughter of John and Josephine Newton Cummins. She was raised and educated in Casselton and attended and graduated from Jamestown College. She obtained a degree in English, Latin, and French. After she graduated, she taught in Jackson, MS, Memphis, TN, and Grand Rapids, MN. Grace married George S. Register in September of 1934 in Bismarck, ND. Grace taught as a substitute teacher at Bismarck High School. Grace tutored students at the University of Mary and was a greeter at the Bismarck Airport. She was active in PEO, DAR, Monday Club, Eastern Star, Republic Women's Club. She enjoyed reading, playing bridge, and traveling Europe, Alaska, Hawaii, and Africa. Grace is survived by one daughter, Joanne C. Hubbard, Marietta, GA; one son and daughter-in-law, George and Susan Register, Roswell, GA; grandchildren, Stephanie Meisel, Stacey Mangum, Matt B. Hubbard, and Scott and Krissie Register; great grandchildren, Jeremie, Josh, and Lee Meisel, and Tyler and Abigail Mangum; and one cousin, Catherine Newton, Minneapolis, MN.
