Martin Schmidt, 88, Bismarck, died April 6, 2007, at Missouri Slope Lutheran Care Center in Bismarck. Funeral services will be held on Tuesday at 1:00 PM at Church of St. Anne in Bismarck with Rev. Ed Wehner officiating. Burial will be at Sunset Memorial Gardens. Visitation will be Monday from 11:00 AM - 9:00 PM at Eastgate Funeral Service where a prayer service will be held at 7:00 PM. Visitation will continue one hour prior to the service at the church. Martin was born on June 17, 1918, in Burnstad, North Dakota, the son of Marcus and Elizabeth Scherrer Schmidt. He grew up on the family farm and attended school near Burnstad. From 1943 - 1946, Martin served in the U.S. Army. Following the service, he returned to Bismarck where he worked as a carpenter. He eventually owned his own home building company and built several homes throughout the upper Midwest including his own home. On June 17, 1978, Martin married Regina Hartze Miller in Mandan. They made their home in Moorhead, Minnesota. Martin retired in 1981 and they returned to Bismarck. Martin enjoyed woodworking, fishing, gardening, and playing cards. He was a member of the VFW, Catholic Order of the Foresters, and Church of St. Anne. He is survived by his wife, Regina of Bismarck; seven stepdaughters, Caroline Richard Sabot of Bismarck, Mary Larry Dresser of Center, Darlene Allan Morris of Mandan, Patricia Ben Bennett of Amarillo, Texas, Nancy Don Peterson of Minot, Shirley Todd Bentley of Clark, Wyoming, and Colleen Miller of Minot; three stepsons, Jerome Miller of Fargo, Kenneth Miller of Alamogordo, New Mexico, and Allen Miller of Newton, North Carolina;
